

Introduction to Buprenorphine in the Emergency Department

Patients with opioid use disorder (OUD) are at a high risk of morbidity and mortality, and are a growing population in our emergency departments. Estimates of one-year mortality after non-fatal opioid overdose range from 5.5% to 10%. In one series, one out of five deaths occur within 30 days of an ED visit and one in 22 deaths will occur within two days. Detox to abstinence programs have low efficacy and patients who fail detox are at especially high risk of overdose with the resumption of use. When buprenorphine is initiated in the emergency department, patients are more than twice as likely to be engaged in substance misuse treatment at 30 days when compared to patients referred to outside treatment programs. OUD is deadly and we have the tools to save lives and make a difference. [Read more.](#)
